The second quarter of 2008 turned out to be a busy time for GPSAR. We received over a dozen callouts which were located across Pennsylvania as well as New Jersey. Several of these involved a standby status. Those standbys were located in Chester, Berks, Bucks and Pike Counties in PA and Gloucester County New Jersey during the months of April ,May and June.

Sadly, the month of May was closed out with a call to the Susquehanna River in York and Lancaster Counties. A young Iraqi War Veteran apparently went overboard in rough water. A concerted effort from family, friends and several area Search teams including GPSAR was in vain. The subject was eventually located deceased.


The Month of June held a search in Sussex County New Jersey for a 57 year old woman with dementia who had been missing for over 24 hours. GPSAR contributed to a find of the slightly dehydrated but otherwise intact subject.


It is always rewarding to see family members reunited after such an emotional event impacts their lives.

People go missing more often than we realize. There are advocacy groups to help with the very young and the very old.

Unfortunately those that don't fall in those categories, frequency leave their families with no advocacy group to support them in the time between missing and calling for a Search and Rescue team. This is an effort to bridge that dangerous gap in time.

Lost persons need an advocate outside the structure of the law enforcement community. While there exists various agencies the deal with specific groups (infant / child, dementia, etc.) our goal is to assist those in filling the gaps. One major gap being the "rest of us" 25 - 65 that simply don't make it home for an unknown reason.

Our goal is to allow the public to not have to reinvent the wheel with each request to law enforcement regarding lost persons. They would contact law enforcement immediately of course but they'd also contact us. We'd help them with the things that people do not think of and have to remember in the middle of a deep emotional crisis (fliers, contacting hospitals, media, etc.) Law enforcement simply does not have the staff or focus for these things. Routine is take a report and proactively wait. Routine, unfortunately, is supported by statistics in that the majority of lost and missing persons are simply "overdue persons". We're looking at that minority that we see on the news that grips us even if exposed to only a few a month.
